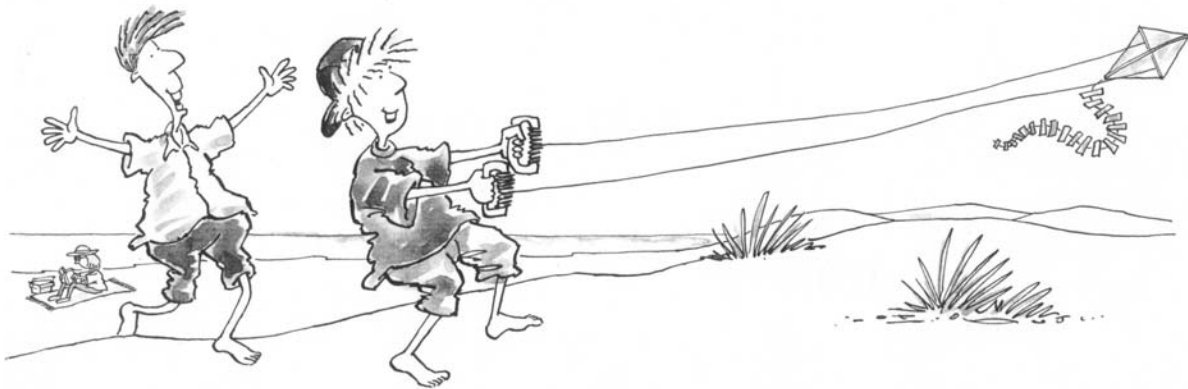

### Step 1: Plan for Success

### Step 3: Tightening Tension

### Step 4: Dynamic Dialogue

Discover how to get rid of the endless 'Hi, how are you/I'm fine/How are you?' passages in writing, learn the four levels of conversation and how authors 'cheat' to make dialogue come alive.

### Step 5: Show Don't Tell

Watch students act out a snooty author coming to town or a grotty teenage brother crazy about skateboarding. When all the ideas are flowing, be amazed at how easily kids can put their ideas onto paper, in just minutes. They are so proud when the best work of the group is shared with everyone.

### Step 7: Exciting Endings

What's the story behind a kid laughing as she catches a bubble or a boy hiding at a footy match? Kids have ten minutes to work it out. Best of all, by the end of the session they promise never to use the ending 'And then I woke up' ever again.
